On a Thursday recess in May, Red Bend students and staff could be found working hard in the textiles department. They had given up their time to contribute to a project of the Sisters of Mercy to make



face masks for Papua New Guinea (PNG). While few people in Australia have been wearing masks during this pandemic time, in PNG, often it has been compulsory to wear a mask to return to school. The country also generally has very little protective equipment to deal with viruses of this kind or any other, and an acute shortage of intensive care beds. This is what two students who participated had to say:

"Being a part of the face mask project was a very rewarding experience as I felt like I had contributed to the community. It gave me a sense of connection and helped me to understand the importance of support for those who are currently in need." Sue Wu

"Being part of the face mask project was something I have been wanting to do since Covid started. I feel that it is a way of showing the health care workers and people in countries who don't have access to the medical facilities we do that we care. It lets them feel better about their days as the world fights this virus away. I love making a difference and this is part of it. Being part of this project meant so much to me as I would like to be involved in medicine some day and help people who can't help themselves. If something like this happened when I am older, I would hope people do the simple things like make masks."

The masks will go to a Mercy boarding school in Wewak, in the north of PNG.
