CASE STUDY:

Sarah and her husband were living a happy life with their three children when everything changed. After a serious car accident left her husband with brain damage and unable to work, Sarah became his carer while raising the kids. With high rent, medical bills, and the rising cost of food and electricity, the family soon struggled.

They moved in with grandparents, all five sharing one room, and later into disability housing. But just before Christmas, their tenancy was suddenly ended, leaving them homeless again. In her family's hour of need, Sarah turned to the St Vincent de Paul Society for support.

Claire, a volunteer of more than 20 years, stepped in to help with food, bills, clothing, and housing. Sarah explained, "The level of compassion... it's really genuine. It's almost like having another family." Every Christmas, Claire ensures the children have presents and a meal to share. "The kids are excited, they feel loved," said Sarah.

Sadly, many families face similar struggles. More people than ever are asking for help because of high rent, food insecurity, and the rising cost of living. As Claire shared, "New people that we are finding, people that we've never seen before." The St Vincent de Paul Society ensures families like Sarah's have a safe home, meals on the table, and presents under the tree—giving children the joy of Christmas and parents the relief of knowing their family is cared for.

- Sarah's family's life changed very quickly after a car accident. Can you think of examples of other challenges that might suddenly change a family's life?
- How do you think Sarah's children might have felt when they lost their home just before Christmas? How might they have felt when Claire from Vinnies stepped in to help?
- Many families today struggle with things like rent, food, and bills. Why do you think it's important for communities and organisations like Vinnies to help?



COST OF LIVING STATISTICS

HOMELESSNESS NATIONAL STATISTICS

- **127,680 Australians** are estimated to be experiencing homelessness in 2025, this is an increase of 5,168 since census night 2021.
- 10.3% of people returned to homelessness after achieving housing.

- 1 in 10 teens reported experiencing homelessness in the past year, with almost 40,000 young people (aged 12-25) accessing homelessness services.
- 40% of people experiencing homelessness are under the age of 24.
- 31% of young people experiencing homelessness are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islanders.

COST OF LIVING AND HOUSING STRESS

- 71% of low-income households nationally are facing housing stress (spending over 30% income in housing)
- A survey found that 32% of low-income earners reported **missing paying** their rent or mortgage on time in the past year due to financial hardship.

SOCIAL HOUSING

- Nationally 223,959 households are on social housing waitlists, with 109,462 on the priority list.
- To meet current and future demands, experts recommend building
 1 million new social and affordable houses over the next 20 years.

FOOD INSECURITY

- 1 in 3 Australian households (32%) are experiencing food insecurity.
- 2 million households are experiencing the most severe level of hardship, regularly skipping meals or going entire days without food.
- 69% of single-parent households are food insecure, with 41% experiencing the severest form.

TO GIVE HAMPERS. FOOD. OR GIFTS

Your local Conference Members are doing good works in the community every week and are best placed to understand the needs of the people they serve.

Usually Conferences are excited to receive your hampers, although it may be preferable in *some* circumstances to give financially or using gift cards instead. Check in with your local Conference to find out!

Where do the hampers go?

Hampers are delivered to families in your community who have called upon Vinnies for a hand-up.

To uphold the dignity of those receiving the hamper, please ensure that all food items are not due to expire for at least 6 months. All items must be non-perishable and undamaged. Look out for packaged food with a Health Star Rating of 3.5 or above. The more stars, the better!

Tip: One way to organise the hampers is to allocate families to different classrooms. Consider the needs of the family, and adjust the hamper accordingly.

TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS



Here are some ideas to bring hope and joy to your classroom in the lead-up to Christmas! **Age group:** suitable for both primary and secondary school students.



DAY 1: PRAY FOR THOSE IN NEED

Send a prayer to those who need God's help this Christmas.



DAY 2: A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE OF HOPE

Write a Christmas card or message of hope for someone in need.



DAY 3: CHRISTMAS CHAIN OF HOPE

Create a paper chain decoration with messages of kindness for your class or Christmas hampers.



DAY 4: BE HOPEFUL

Draw or write what 'hope' means to you and display it in class.



DAY 5: SMILE

Smile at five people today to spread kindness.



DAY 6: DISCUSSION

Discuss in class: What does Christmas mean to you beyond presents?



DAY 7: SHOW GRATITUDE

Write down five things you are grateful for this week and display in class on a gratitude wall.



DAY 8: SPREAD KINDNESS

Perform a random act of kindness for someone without telling them it was you.



DAY 9: RAISE AWARENESS

Learn a fact about homelessness or poverty in Australia and share it with your class to help advocate for others.

DAY 10: CHRISTMAS CREATIVITY

Write a Christmas poem, prayer or wish for people doing it tough this Christmas.



DAY 11: CHECK IN ON OTHERS

Sit with someone new at recess or lunch and ask how their day is going.



DAY 12: CHRISTMAS CAROLING

Sing a Christmas song or carol together to finish the 12 days with joy!



WISH ON A CHRISTMAS STAR

Context: This activity encourages students to consider those who might be facing difficulties during Christmas, fostering empathy, compassion, and the spirit of giving. Through discussion and craft, students will make a wish on someone else's behalf.

Age Group: Suitable for lower and upper primary school students

Resources:

- Printed star stencil (teacher to provide)
- Strips of colourful paper (approx. 2–3 cm wide, A4 length)
- Craft supplies for decorating star (pencils, textas, paint, glitter etc)
- · Scissors and Glue

Run Time: 25-30 minutes

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION

1. Class Discussion (10 mins):

Begin by talking about what Christmas means to different people. Then gently guide the class to think about how Christmas might feel for someone who is facing challenges — such as individuals without a home, having issues with their health, or experiencing financial difficulties.

Ask:

- Can you think of someone who might not find Christmas easy this year?
- What might be tricky for them?
- What do you think could help make their Christmas feel a little brighter?

2. Wish Reflection:


Ask students to quietly think of a Christmas wish they could make for someone in need—something that would help, comfort or show kindness.

3. Craft Activity (15-20 mins):

Give each student a printed star stencil. Students decorate the star creatively using craft materials, and then in the centre, they write "I wish...". On one or more long coloured strips, students write a wish they have made on behalf of someone else (they can write more than one). Attach the strips to the bottom of the star to make a shooting star tail.

4. Display:

Create a wall or window display titled "Christmas Wishing Stars" to celebrate students' generous thinking and the true meaning of Christmas.





REAL TALK: COST OF LIVING AND CHRISTMAS

Why This Matters: Christmas is usually a time of fun, food, and family – but for many Australians, it's also a time of stress. With rent, groceries, and bills going up, a lot of people are struggling to afford even the basics. Vinnies is here to help – and you can be part of that help too.

Age Group: Suitable for secondary school students

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION

Street Survey - What Does Christmas Cost?

You're a youth journalist putting together a story for your school newsletter on the 'real cost of Christmas.' Interview three classmates or family members about how the cost of living has affected their holiday plans. Ask them the questions below and record their answers. You can keep it anonymous if they prefer.

Interview Questions:

- 1. What's one thing your family has had to cut back on this Christmas?
- 2. Do you think Christmas is too focused on money and gifts? Why or why not?
- 3. What would make Christmas feel more meaningful to you or your family?
- 4. Have you ever heard of the Vinnies Christmas Appeal prior to this? What do you know about it?

Your Report:

Summarise the most interesting things you heard in a short paragraph below. You can include quotes or general impressions.

Reflect:

- 1. What surprised you the most about what people said?
- 2. How can students like you support those doing it tough this Christmas?





SNOWBALL CHANCE OF LIFE ACTIVITY

Context: Sometimes, life doesn't go as planned. Unexpected events such as illness, loss of a job or even a natural disaster can turn someone's world upside down. While many of us feel safe and secure today, the reality is that for thousands of Australians, just one unforeseen challenge can push them towards homelessness.

This activity invites you to walk in someone else's shoes. To consider how quickly circumstances can change, and to reflect on how compassion, community, and support—like that offered by Vinnies—can make all the difference.

Age Group: for primary and secondary students

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION

On a piece of paper, students are to write down three things that bring them joy at Christmas. This might include things such as 'spending time with family', 'sharing presents with one another', 'putting up the Christmas tree'.

Next, ask them to scrunch up their piece of paper to make a 'snowball'.

Place a bucket at one end of the room and instruct students that they need to throw their 'snowball' into the bucket. Place a clear marker or tape where they need to stand to throw from.

Before each student attempts to throw their 'snowball', they must select a 'life chances' card to know where they will throw from –

stepping forwards – or backwards – as determined by their card.


If a student's 'snowball' reaches the bucket, they are granted their Christmas joy.

Reflect as a class on how people can end up experiencing disadvantage through no fault of their own and how this may impact them at Christmas. How can we as a community bring more joy to those who are struggling this festive season?

Your family member becomes physically ill. You now have become their full-time carer and have no time to focus on your studies.
